Domestic Market

The annual inflation rate remained steady at 2.8 percent in May 2025, as transport costs fell sharply. Meanwhile, the RMB/BER business confidence index declined to 40 in Q2 2025, from a near three-year high of 45 recorded in both Q1 amid global trade uncertainties and domestic logistical hurdles. Economic activity was resilient as the economy edged up by 0.1 percent in the first quarter of 2025. In addition, the Reserve Bank cut its key interest rate by 25 bps to 7.25% in May.

Market Expectations

According to SARB, volatility of global economic conditions have heightened due to rising tariffs and market uncertainty leading to lower growth forecasts. The South African economic growth edged up in the first quarter of 2025. The ongoing trade war between the U.S. and China is expected to adversely affect the economy through demand side factors.

The bank reduced its 2025 growth prediction downward to 1.2 percent and 1.8 percent in 2027 due to weaker growth attributed to subdued demand and continuing supply-side fragilities. The bank is considering an inflation objective of 3 percent, which is the low end of the target range and considers it as more attractive than the baseline of 4.5 percent.

United States US President made a fresh tariff announcement, targeting some of the key partners including South Korea and Japan with 25% tariff on imported goods starting August. Whereas the annual inflation rate climbed to 2.4% in May 2025, the unemployment rate declined to 4.1% in June 2025 defying market expectations of an increase.

Europe annual price inflation declined to 1.9 percent yearon-year in May 2025, down from 2.2% in April and the area also saw a rise in economic activity as the economy grew by 0.6% in the first quarter of 2025, doubling the earlier estimate of 0.3%. The unemployment rate edged up to 6.3% in May 2025 from a record low of 6.2% in April.

Asia Chinese President Xi Jinping aims to strengthen ties with key Southeast Asian neighbours as trade tensions with the U.S. continue to escalate. China has also raised tariffs on U.S. goods to 125% from 84% stating it will disregard any future tariff hikes by the U.S.

Brent Crude continues to face bearish sentiment as investors weigh in the potential impact of US tariffs on global fuel demand. The US is set to announce higher trade tariff rates which are expected to affect the price of oil and will take effect starting August.

Gold fell as the US signals progress on multiple trade agreements and announced an extended tariff reprieve for some countries. .

Hope for the Future

Second Quarter Review

We note some of the economic events that transpired in the second quarter.

At the beginning of the year 2025, there was greater positive sentiment among policy makers about the consumer-driven economy compared to what the sentiment was last year. Generally, the economy was projected to grow by about 1.7 percent with a progressive increase to over 2 percent in the coming years, inflation was expected to be lower and interest rates were projected for a decline. According to Deloitte, these improvements were as a result of structural effects like improved energy supply, and increased private sector participation in ports.

In the second quarter of 2025 however, the economy showed mixed performance, with some sectors experiencing growth while others faced challenges. Manufacturing output rose 0.5% year-on-year in May. In May the Monetary Policy Committee of the SARB reduced interest rates by 25 basis points as well as forecast of GDP to 1.1 percent. Annual inflation fell to below 3 percent to 2.8 percent. The bank also noted upside risks to inflation, stemming from the geopolitical events which have a potential of slowing down global trade and growth.

There have been significant challenges faced by The Government of National Unity (GNU). Notably, a failure to uphold the principles of collaboration and commitment to transparency in addressing the issue of corruption. This is likely to slow down the goal of the government in the areas of economic growth, job creation and governance. Regardless, the GNU still offers opportunity for reform, even amidst global uncertainty.

The US President Donald Trump announced a 30% tariff on South African imports starting from 1 August 2025. US is South Africa's second-largest trading partner, and the tariff could significantly impact some key sectors such as automobiles. The decision has been criticized for undermining the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA), which provides duty-free access to the US market for many South African products. AGOA is a US legislation that regulates US trade with Africa and is due to expire in September 2025.
